

Pinkeye (Conjunctivitis)

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What is pinkeye?

 An infection of the eye/eyelid caused by a bacteria or virus; sometimes by allergens and irritants (swimming pools or smog). One of the most common treatable eye conditions of adults and children.

What are symptoms that could occur?

- Red and swollen white part of eye or inside eyelids
- Increased tearing
- White, yellow, or green eye discharge
- Itchy, irritated, and/or burning eyes
- Increased sensitivity to light
- Gritty feeling in the eye
- Crusting of eyelids or lashes, especially overnight

How is it spread?

- Direct contact with eye drainage
- Touching a contaminated object (pencils, toys, etc.) and then touching one's eye
- Disease signs usually appear 2 to 5 days after exposure

How is it diagnosed and treated?

- Primary Care Provider evaluation
- May be treated with antibiotic eye drops or ointment

How can it be prevented?

- · Wash your hands often
- Avoid touching or rubbing your eyes
- Educate people about personal cleanliness and the risk associated with use of common towels and toilet articles
- Avoid communal eyedroppers, medicines, eye makeup, instruments or towels

Should the sick individual be isolated?

- Individuals should be excluded from the population with the first signs of illness
- Proper hand-washing is very important in the prevention of spread of infection

When can the individual return to the general population?

 Individuals may return after diagnosis and antibiotic treatment for 24 hours or after drainage has stopped

Should facilities do special cleaning?

Special cleaning is not necessary. Routine cleaning with EPA approved products is recommended
